Vision

Scotland's community health and social care services support everyone when they need it.

The National Care Service will:

- Transform people's experience of social care support and related services, strengthen
 prevention and community-based support and reform access.
- Continue integrating community health and social care and strengthen partnerships working with other services and agencies.
- Ensure that individuals can participate in their care design.
- Ensure people's needs are met holistically and driven by the outcomes that are important to them and their communities.
- Strengthen prevention, early intervention and end of life care.

Co-design approach and engagement



We want to have a National Care Service that best fits the needs of everyone in Scotland.

To do that, we need to hear from people directly and that means **co-designing with them.**

Co-design is working alongside the people who use and deliver health and social care services, and the organisations which represent them, to ensure we get a future organisation that works for everyone.

Approach to co-design

Our Lived Experience Experts Panel is one of the ways people with lived experience can take part in co-design activities being led by Scottish Government.

The panel is made up of people who have real experience of using or providing social care support in Scotland. Their expertise will help shape the future NCS and make sure we're working with the right people, in the right way.

The **Stakeholder Register** is for organisations, to help us build an understanding of which organisations may want to take part in future co-design activities.

Co-design approach Five initial co-design themes



- information sharing to improve social care support
- 2. keeping social care support local
- 3. realising rights and responsibilities
- 4. making sure your voice is heard
- 5. valuing the workforce

Co-design approach Five stages

1. Understanding

Thinking about what needs to change and why. Looking at the data and evidence that exists and agreeing what it tells us and where more is needed. Considering the things that will impact what change can happen (for example how the laws about data protection will affect how information sharing will work).

2. Making sense of information and coming up with ideas

Generating ideas about what could change, how change might work, look and feel. Testing out ideas for changes and making sure they will work in practice.

3. Agreeing

Helping to check that proposed decisions that result from the work of understanding and imagining are the right ones.

4. Drafting of regulations

Co-design conclusions will be developed into regulations

5. Review

It will be important to share the draft regulations back with people for review of the alignment with co-design process.

The NCS Forum

The event is a yearly opportunity to reflect on the development of the NCS and the national co-design process.
