10.05	Andrew MacDonald, Models of Care, Scottish Government Andrew will outline the steps the Scottish Government is taking in relation to re- thinking adult social care eligibility criteria further to the Joint Statement of Intent with COSLA and as part of the work of developing a National Care Service.

We need to change the culture which is often driven by processes and systems and the need to 'manage resources' and build more trust between practitioners and carers/supported people

Staff should have more autonomy and should be able to make decisions and provide services without unnecessary bureaucracy and several layers of decision making

Assessment and eligibility criteria should take into account a person's strengths, relationships and access to community support, without using this to undercut their need for more formal support.

Having a good conversation and a good relationship with your care manager should help to build an alliance and explore how to achieve the best outcomes for support
